Thoughts from Tim: Six Funerals and Three Weddings

Perhaps you've seen the movie "Four Weddings and a Funeral" -- a British comedy from the early 1990s about a group of friends and their search for love. A cast photo is to the right. (If you haven't seen the film, I recommend it.)

At Westmoreland we're experiencing our own version of that these days -- six funerals (or memorial services and interments) and three weddings from mid-September through mid-October.

One of the high privileges of being a minister is to stand with a couple at the moment of their marriage or to stand with a family at a time of death.

There's an old preacher adage that we "hatch, match and dispatch." Which is true. We -- and by "we" I mean the church (you, me, all of us) -- celebrate with each other, we care for other, we pray for each other, we stand witness to life's grand moments with one another. Births, confirmations, baptisms, marriages, divorces, illness, funerals, joys -- those are our moments.

Perhaps we no longer get decked out in morning coats and extravagantly brimmed hats. (We can leave that to the British royal family and to movie stars.) But we do stand with each other -- hand in hand, shoulder to shoulder, heart touching heart. We need each other. With all our faults and fears, we need each other. That is why I am part of a Christian community.

In the movie, "Four Weddings and a Funeral," the character Gareth (he's third from left in the photo) says: A toast before we go into battle. True love. In whatever shape or form it may come. May we all in our dotage be proud to say, "I was adored once too."

Gareth's final phrase is actually a quote from Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night." In some ways, the line is wistful: you get the sense that the one who once adored the character no longer adores him. On the other hand the line echoes the deep desire of the human heart: to be loved.

You may not make it to all six memorial events and or the three weddings that have taken place or will take place in the life of Westmoreland, but you are part of a community of love and compassion and caring.

In the words of the scripture writer, "Beloved, let us love one another." That is our high calling, our hard work, our happy privilege. Amen.

Thoughts from the Director of Music: Let's Be Upfront About Joining the Choir *(in case you missed it last month!)* And More . . .

Let me be upfront about it. Joining a choir is a significant commitment that demands much from those who undertake it. That is however, only one side of it.

What a choir can give you physically, socially, and spiritually greatly outweighs anything you could give up by joining. Through clinical research, especially over the past ten years, it has been proven that the activity of singing is accompanied by measurable physiological, neurological, and emotional benefits. In case this is not convincing enough let's look at it from a different angle. When you join a choir you join a family of caring, sympathetic, and interesting individuals. No scientific study or research is needed to demonstrate that those folks who have joined a choir are generally happy people. Just ask any of them and you will get a glowing review of their experience!

Another aspect of singing in a choir that needs pointing out is its importance within the stewardship of a church or a community. By becoming a choir member you give time and talent to enrich the church and/or the community in one of its most meaningful activities. No amount of money can substitute for this. Not yet convinced?

Then let me point out that there is an emotional and spiritual component to singing with others that can only be described as inspiring. When you are in the middle of singing Mozart's "Requiem," Handel's "Messiah," or a Bach Cantata, to name just a few examples, and you are surrounded by the magical sounds of choir and orchestra coming together to recreate monuments of humanity, the world and all its troubles and tribulations cease to exist and the spirit truly becomes one with the body.

If you find at least one of these above mentioned reasons compelling enough to give it a whirl please don't hesitate to join us at least just to see what it is like. The Chancel Choir rehearses on Thursdays from 8:00 to 10:00pm and on Sundays from 9:00 to 9:45am. Or, please consider joining us for the choir retreat (see schedule below).

Service at the German Lutheran Church - November 9, 5:00pm

(Pilgrim Lutheran Church, 5500 Massachusetts Avenue, Bethesda)

A special service held by the German Lutheran Church Washington, D.C. in collaboration with the German Embassy and ecumenical friends will commemorate the day when the Berlin Wall fell on November 9th, 1989. The event changed the history of the world – and the personal lives of many Germans. Millions were liberated from communist oppression. The service will give thanks for what many still consider a miracle. It will commemorate the non-violent resistance especially among East-German church groups that led to the so-called “peaceful revolution”.

The German Ambassador will address the congregation. Westmoreland's Chancel Choir will contribute to the ecumenical service with Beethoven's “Ode to Joy” which became a symbol of elation in 1989 and now serves as the European anthem. A choir from the German embassy staff will join them in several pieces of great music.

Thoughts from the Associate Minister for Education

After the worship services in August, Westmorelanders participated in a number of hands-on mission projects to share Christian kindness with the greater community. We prepared care packages for the sick and hungry, school kits for students in disaster-stricken areas, and worked together to refurbish our church school classrooms. On our final Sunday of mission projects, we wrote cards to the workers at the Centreville Labor Resource Center (Centreville, VA) and Casa de Maryland (Silver Spring, MD) in honor of Labor Day. It is said that unexpected acts of kindness are the most powerful, least costly, and most underrated agents of social change. Through the simple act of writing a card, Westmorelanders joined a growing movement of folks dedicated to making their communities more inclusive and welcoming. Thoughts from the Membership Coordinator: Leaving Church

During the time I've been Membership Coordinator, I've thought quite a bit about how people leave Westmoreland, other than through moving away or dying. Sometimes I find out the real reason, sometimes not. But always, there is a sense of loss. I've wanted to write about how people leave church, but then I came across an article written in 2009 by Rev. Dr. John A. Ross, Senior Minister at Wayzata Community Church, Wayzata, Minnesota. He has said it better than I ever could. The following is excerpted from his article.



People leave churches every day for understandable reasons that are just part of life: they move away, a new marriage, they reach the end of life. In these times we work to make leaving the church as positive an experience as when they first joined—a time marked with joy, promise and possibilities.

People leave churches for other less-understandable reasons as well. Some are angry over a specific issue, while others point to a general malaise of spiritual growth; some will point to preaching or music that doesn't inspire them, while others lament non-specifically that they just don't feel "connected."

If you are leaving the church, let someone know. Employ the same grace and care that was extended you by the church when you joined. Your church needs to be aware of the real concerns you have and would rather hear from you personally than from someone else or in a chance-encounter in the community.

If you are thinking about leaving the church, think again. Pick anyone you know in the leadership structure of your church and call that person—just to talk. A hope would be to get to the real issues beneath and behind the surface reasons. Your spiritual health, well-being and growth remain the church's primary concern.

If you are staying, get engaged. We know that being engaged in the life of the community is critical to a sense of belonging. There are literally hundreds of ways for you to share the journey with others that will deepen your inward, outward and upward relationships. Get to your big church (worship) and small church (small groups) every week.

For the moment, be reminded that we are ultimately defined by discipleship, not mere membership. You have important gifts of God to share with a world very much in need. You have remarkable gifts of God to receive. Giving and receiving requires relationship. Let's keep our connections strong, rooted in unity, service, learning and worship.

And to these words, I say Amen.
